



From the Front Desk


This has been a record-breaking year for the 1000 Islands History Museum. Over 41,500 people visited the museum this year, making it the busiest in over 20 years!

Since the release of the 2024 Spring Newsletter, the Museum has accomplished a lot. We opened three new exhibits, including the updated "Learning to Fly" Link Trainer exhibit, the seasonal "Aquaculture" exhibit, and our new "Gananoque Remembers" military history display. Our Winter exhibit, "Remember the Music," is also opened at the end of November.

We had a very busy tour schedule, delivering guided tours to 18 groups from all over the world. We also started offering walk-in guided tours, allowing us to engage with even more visitors. In addition to tour groups, we welcomed 9 school groups for tours and programming.

The Museum was very active in the community this Summer and Fall. We participated in many community events, including LeFestiVILES, Joel Stone's Birthday Celebration, Canada Day celebrations, Waterfront Festival, and local Pride events. Staff also delivered 11 presentations for community groups and organizations, including the Senior Support Network and the Rotary Club.

As 2024 comes to an end, we are extremely proud of all that we accomplished this year, and are very excited for 2025!

Update From Collections

2024 was a great year for the Town of Gananoque Civic Collection. Our excellent interns, seasonal employees, co-op students, and volunteers at the 1000 Islands History Museum continue to work very hard to ensure the Collection is better preserved and more accessible than ever before. Since the Spring, we completed the 1000 Islands History Museum On-Demand Programming project. Six education programs now incorporate educational artifacts, including one new program based on the Link Trainer and one new program specifically about how museums care for artifacts. We are excited to run these programs this school year. We also made significant progress updating the Collections Database, making it easier for us to present artifact information to the public. We continue to feature more Civic Collections artifacts in exhibitions. These include permanent displays at the 1000 Islands History Museum, like the updated "Learning to Fly" Link Trainer exhibit and an all-new Fishing display on our 2nd floor.

As always, the hard work continues, and we are looking forward to new projects in 2025!
